A Proclamation

Whereas, Sepsis is the body's overwhelming and life-threatening response to infection that can lead to tissue damage, organ failure, and death; and

Whereas, Sepsis is the leading cause of death in hospitals, and among the top reasons for hospitalization and hospital readmissions in the United States; and

 ${\it W}$ hereas, More than 40,000 residents in the Commonwealth each year are diagnosed with sepsis and countless more family members are affected by sepsis; and

 ${\it W}$ hereas, More than 40% of people have never heard of sepsis and fewer than 1% recognize its symptoms; and

Whereas, Anyone can get sepsis, but that elderly residents, those with multiple chronic conditions and infants are at higher risk of being diagnosed with sepsis; and

 ${\it W}$ hereas, Until a cure for sepsis is found, early detection is the surest hope for survival and limiting disability for survivors; and

Whereas, Not only during the month of September, but throughout the entire year, it is important that we continue to spread awareness of this medical condition across our Commonwealth in hopes of preventing future suffering,

Now, Therefore, I, Charles D. Baker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, do hereby proclaim September 13th 2018, to be,

SEPSIS AWARENESS DAY

And urge all the citizens of the Commonwealth to take cognizance of this event and participate fittingly in its observance.
